- ~ To give children, young adults and the young at heart adults a chance to express their individuality and "Joie de vivre".**
- ~ To discover their identity, to fulfil their emotional needs and to find happiness through competitive cycling.**

Sfalcin thinks cycling can boom in Windsor

Aldo Sfalcin's dream is to see competitive cycling become as popular with young people in Windsor as soccer has in a very short time.

With support coming mainly from ethnic groups of European background, Windsor has always had a few regional and national class cyclists. In fact, considering the relatively small numbers of competitive cyclists in the city, Windsor has done quite well.

But Sfalcin believes the growth potential for the sport is enormous if riders can be attracted at an early age and given some encouragement and financial support.

To help realize that dream, he and a few other riders, have founded Windsor's newest cycling club – **Maple Leaf Cycling Club** – which has already attracted about 36 young riders. They range in age from 13 to 24.

"Basically I wanted to start a club to build up the number of riders in the city. Something like the soccer leagues did," he said.

Other clubs in the city include those of the Windsor Bicycle Club, Ciociaro Club, Caboto Velo Club and Cannella Bicycle Club. Sfalcin estimates the five clubs have a total of about 70 competitive riders among them – a figure he believes can be increased many times.

Sfalcin, 40, has been riding and racing bicycles competitively with success for more than 20 years. He was fourth last year in the Canadian Veterans Championships. But so far this year he's been spending more time coaching and fund raising than doing any training himself.

To be successful, Sfalcin believes a cycling club has to provide some financial support for its young riders. The sport is a lot more expensive than most people believe. Even novice riders will probably have to spend \$400-

500 on a bicycle and experienced riders will think nothing of spending three to four times that.

But buying a bicycle is just the start. Clothing, shoes, spare tires and other equipment add to the expense. Entry fees and travel expenses to races are other costs. "The difficulty with cycling is the expense," Sfalcin said. "It's like a poor man's polo."

While parents of young hockey players or figure skaters may spend comparative amounts, Sfalcin said young cyclists seem to have trouble persuading their parents that the sport is just as worthwhile.

Sfalcin's club has been running bingo's and dances to raise funds to defray travel and equipment costs of his riders. He believes sponsorship is the key to the development of competitive cyclists.

The Wolverine Cycling Club in Detroit is able to do much more for its young riders because of major sponsors, he said. So far, Sfalcin has support from Pillsworth's Sky Chalet – which recently added cycling clothing and equipment – but he's looking for other sponsors as well. With the opening of the Ciociaro Club's outdoor cycling track last year, Sfalcin thinks cycling can boom in the Windsor area. It gives riders a safe place to train away from traffic, which is an important consideration with parents concerned about their children competing with traffic. It also provides a meeting place for competitive cyclists.

Sfalcin said young people interested in the sport can come out to the track, see what their peers are doing and find out if they're interested themselves.

"It (the track) is definitely going to help the sport grow a lot" he said. The Ciociaro cycling track is one of only two in Ontario. Sudbury has the other.

Local cyclists selected

Local riders Vince Stehle and Greg Allen have been selected for the Ontario Junior Men's cycling team following tryouts this past weekend in Niagara Falls. Allen, of the Caboto Club team, and Stehle, of the Maple Leaf Cycling Club, finished seventh and eighth respectively in the 20-kilometre time trial.

Allen then won one of four short criteriums while Stehle finished second in two of the four races.

The six member Ontario team will take part in an international competition next weekend in Niagara Falls.

Michigan and Ontario riders are expected for the **Colio Cup** bicycle races Sunday at the Ciociaro club track on North Talbot Road.

Novice races start at 10 a.m. and licensed riders compete at noon.

A five-mile ladies' novice race saw Michelle Goveia of the High Park finish first with Kelly Devlin of Maple Leaf second and Laurie Collodel of Cannella third.

Leamington cyclist drops from U.S. marathon race

Marathon cyclist Danny Quick had hoped to live up to his name when he entered the 5,000-kilometres Race across America from San Francisco to Washington D.C. The only Canadian participating in the grueling ultra-marathon, the Leamington factory worker had entered the competition with one goal in mind: complete a race in which 65% of the riders fail to reach the finish line during the allotted eight to ten days.

The dream came to an abrupt and unexpected end Tuesday, when four days and more and more than 1,600-km into the race Quick was reported out of the competition. The race's telephone hotline service provided no further details.

"I just want to be first Canadian to do it," he said last week before leaving for San Francisco.

"The other two who tried didn't make it. I want to finish but I'm also going with the idea of winning."

Quick, 31, had been training for the race since November, logging countless kilometers along concession roads in Essex and Kent counties.

At noon Tuesday, Quick was reported to be in Colorado making good progress but well behind the leaders.

Six hours later, Quick was announced as one of the three riders who had dropped out.

In the last month, the member of the Maple City Cycling Club followed a special training program, which involved two weeks of intensive training, a week of relatively relaxed cycling, followed by a final week of "normal" exercise.

Quick qualified for one of the 28 places in the race this year when he finished eighth at a 1,160-km race in Chicago. About 300 cyclists tried to qualify for the ultra-marathon.

Accompanying Quick on his cross continent odyssey were three van loads of relatives and friends who served as his support crew.

One victory for Coulter

Coulter won the cadet's 25-km race held at the Exhibition Grounds to become the first member of the recently-formed Windsor Pillsworth-Maple Leaf Cycling Club to win an out-of-town event.

Pillsworth-Maple Leaf was organized last December, becoming the fifth cycling club in Windsor.

Among novice riders 15-years and over, PMF's Paul Lefferman placed second and Joey Elliot seventh out of a field of 30-over a 9-km course.

Kelly Devlin finished third among women 18 and over in the 9-km race and Marshall Sfalcin finished fifth among the cadets. Franco Ricci of the Ciociaro Club finished fifth out of 140 in the 40-km race for senior 3 riders and PMF's John Santarossa was 14th.

Chatham's Orlando Goveia finished first among 25 seniors competing alongside the senior 3s.

In the 70-km feature of professionals and seniors 1s, 2s, Eon D1Ornellas of the Toronto Bllor Team finished first, John McKay of the Windsor Caboto Velo Club as fifth among senior 2s.

Bike mishap hasn't hurt his ambition

Kirel Racovitis wants to climb out of his hospital bed and back on his racing bike.

But first, the 14-year old Windsor boy will have to overcome the paralysis of his right shoulder, arm and hand from a head-on-collision with a car March 23 that turned his bicycle a

"pretzel" and left him with kidney damage, and cuts to his face and legs.

"They said he'd have to take about two years physiotherapy" to counter the effects of a torn nerve in his shoulder, said his father, Tom Racovitis.

His son, who someday hopes to enter the Olympics, is plotting a return to the racing circuit from his bed at Windsor Western Hospital and is looking forward to delivery of a new racing bike he ordered before the accident.

"I think I'm going to put it at the foot of his bed as an incentive," the elder Racovitis said Tuesday.

"With his perseverance, I'm not going to say (bike racing) isn't possible," added Racovitis, who said his son's friends have worked out a training schedule.

The collision occurred when Racovitis was training with friends near Walker and South Talbot roads.

Racovitis' condition has improved to the point where he could be home this week.

Grandma makes 800-km bike trip

Sheila Snyder's children thought she was "crazy" when she announced plans to celebrate her 50th birthday with an 800-km bicycle ride.

Snyder, a grandmother of five who celebrated her birthday September 12, decided to make the return trip to her parents' home in Collingwood, Ont., on the 12-speed bike her children gave her last Christmas.

Snyder, a cycling novice, trained four months with 80-km jaunts three days a week through the backroads of Essex County.

"I wanted to do something special for this birthday," said Snyder, a machine operator at Windsor Plastics.

"My kids said I was crazy."

Her 51-year companion, Walde Karweise, a metal repair specialist at Chrysler Canada LTD. Is a member of the Maple Leaf Bicycle Club and races competitively in Windsor, training five days a week.

Snyder and Karweise arrived home Saturday, and Snyder's family celebrated her feast by stringing a finish ribbon across the driveway of her Alexis road home and popping a bottle of sparkling wine – before breaking into a chorus of Happy Birthday.

"It's not every day you turn 50," Snyder said shortly after she arrived home about 6:15 p.m.

"I'm a little sore, but when you do something like this you really feel like you've accomplished something," she said. The couple left for Collingwood September 9, and arrived three days later in time to celebrate her birthday with her parents. After a three days layover, they set off on the return trip. They rode an average of about 130-km a day, and camped by the roadside. Each morning, they made breakfast on a Coleman stove; then set out on four hours of cycling, followed by a restaurant dinner and three more hours on the road. Except for a rolling landscape and a stiff southwest wind on the last leg of their return along highway 2, there were no problems.

15,000 flock to bike race

So, it isn't the Detroit Grand Prix? It's better!

The McDonald's-Windsor Star Classic cycling race doesn't have the horsepower of that noisy race across the river.

But it has a lot more class.

On Saturday about 15,000 people flocked to the eighth annual Classic to watch the Cyclists whiz by on their sleek machines. They sipped cappuccino, ate barbequed Italian sausages and basked in the sunshine that came just in time for the big races.

The organizers breathed a sigh of relief. A half hour before the first race, the rain was pelting down and only a handful of diehards huddled under the awnings on Erie Street.

Gord Way, president of the host Windsor Cycling Club, said cancelling or postponing the event was "out of the question." Seven years ago, the race went ahead even though the streets were flooded right up to the curb line by a heavy rain.

"We never stop the race for rain. It's a sunshine or rain sport." He said cyclists are a hardy lot and adjust their technique to the slick pavement.

Erik Miljan might take issue with that. The 15-year old cyclist from Waterloo was in the first Cadet race which was run in a steady rain just before the sun came out. A half hour later he was drying his socks and jersey on the hood of a car.

"It seemed to be clearing up nicely. It just rains for my race," he said with a wry smile.

Miljan said the riders had to contend with slippery white lines on the road and water flying up the wheels. He recalled a tense moment when he could feel his skinny tire slide along the pavement.

"I was scared during the race, I didn't go down but I could feel my tire slip and grab."

Race chairman Guy Laporte said he was worried about the effects of the rain because organizers had put a special effort into boosting attendance this year. Snow fences along the route were replaced wrought-iron railings and a free race program was distributed. A Toronto company equipped with a photo finish camera was hired to add professional expertise to judging of the events, which were won by Ed Maset of Hamilton and Windsor's Kelly Ann Way.

In the past, North American cycling has been dominated by recent immigrants from Europe where the sport has a long tradition. But Laporte said race organizers in Toronto have succeeded in convincing "yuppie" fans that cycle racing is an elegant and exciting sport.

"With a little slicker presentation we are trying to reach out to those people. We say 'Come on down.' This is more than a one-street ethnic bike race."

Laporte said the race is also a good way of introducing the suburban fans to Erie Street ethnic pleasures such as a good cup of espresso or a dish of gelati. There are people living out in St. Clair Beach and Tecumseh who have never discovered this place."

Terry and Claude Jean are anything but recent yuppie converts to bicycle racing. The race course goes right past their home on Giles Boulevard. For the past eight years they have turned their front yard into an unofficial pit stop complete with a barbeque and plenty of picnic food. Terry said they weren't about to let a bit of rain spoil their fun. Neighbors turned out in force to erect a makeshift tent. "With a little bit of string and a little bit of wood we were all set." Terry said.

Crowds jam Via Italia

Via Italia, also known as Erie Street, was jammed Saturday as fans flocked in to enjoy the exciting, elegant sport of bicycle racing. The 8th annual MacDonald's-Windsor Star Classic has become one of the most popular cycle races in the province with competitors vying for \$15,000 in prize money. The dark rainy skies opened up just long enough to provide perfect conditions for all but one race.

Organizers spruced up race area and printed programs this year and were rewarded with the largest crowd ever.

Guy Laporte of the Windsor Bicycle Club estimated the crowd swelled to 15,000 for the final race.

While the cyclists whizzed by on the 1.6-km circuit, spectators lined the street and sampled Italian treats in the sidewalk cafes. Ed Maset of Hamilton pulled out in the last two laps of the featured men's race to win the Bob McAleer Memorial Cup for the second year in a row. In her first hometown race since 1983, Kelly Ann Way of Windsor won the featured women's race.

Cyclist named to national team

Windsor's Vince Stehle was selected to Canada's national junior cycling team for road racing this past weekend.

Stehle, 18, was the top junior rider at a two-day selection trial held in Quebec City.

He finished 10th overall and was the top junior in Saturday's 80-km Criterium and he was the fourth junior across the final line in Sunday's 140-km stage.

"It was just fantastic, unbelievable how well things went for me," said the grade 11 Assumption Student. "There was one climb in Sunday's race that was just pure hell. I've never suffered so much in my life."

Stehle was the only Ontario rider selected to the five-men junior team. Three came from Quebec and one from B.C. The junior team is off to Italy, June 26 for two stage races.

Road Race

In a 130-km road race which encompassed a round-trip between Windsor and Leamington, Robert Zuech of the Caboto Velo Club placed first and Steve Ward of the Michigan Downriver Club finished second. Lisa Belawetz of the Maple Leaf Club was first in the 60-km 'B' event.

Criterium

New Zealand cyclist Brian Fowler is a long way from home, but Erie Street made a nice substitute Sunday as he won the seniors 1 and 2 division of the Erie Street Criterium.

Taking second in the day's main event was Paul Murray of Toronto, while Kelly Wallace, also of Toronto took third. Other winners were: Chatham's Wayne Plaquet (novice under 17), Windsor Maple Leaf's Clive Perry (18 and over), Ajax's Luke Hollins (cadets), Niagara Falls' Frank Scio (juniors), Toronto's Brice Aubrey (veterans and masters), and Sault Ste. Marie's Ed Diagostino (seniors 3 and 4).

Cycling:

Two Windsor cyclists placed among the leaders in the opening race of the provincial selection races for the Ontario Junior men's Cycling team Sunday in Zephier, Ontario.

Vince Stehle of the Maple Leaf Cycling Club placed second, while Denny Pedri of the Caboto Velo Club was fourth in the 80-km race.

The two race series is also qualifier for the Ontario Canada Games team and the Eastern Junior World championship trials.

Can-Am Cycling:

Dan Pedri, of the Caboto Velo Cycling Club, won the 100-km main event at a Can-Am Series race held at the Ciociaro Club Thursday.

The Can-Am Series holds races every two weeks at the Ciociaro track.

Vince Stehle, of the Maple Leaf Cycling Club, finished second to Pedri and Paul Leferman, also of the Maple Leaf, was third. In the 70-km 'B' event, Shawn Vangassen, of the Chatham Cycling Club, was the winner over Caboto Velo's Jeff Elliott and Gary Fogal.

Upcoming cycling events:

The Maple Leaf Cycling Club is hosting a 137-km road race in Leamington this Sunday.

The race, for senior three riders, will get underway at 1:30 p.m. but there will a full slate of racing in other categories and interested riders can register on race day.

Novice riders must register prior to 10 a.m. and all registration will be done on the 4th Concession between Townline and old No. 3 Highway.

Cycling:

Paul Sovran, of the Maple Leaf Cycling Club, won the novice 18 years and over men's 30-km event at the Delaware Road Races Sunday.

Tom Williams, also of the Maple Leaf Cycling Club, was second in the 58-km race for masters. Lisa Belawetz was sixth in novice women's 18 year and over 30-km race and Paul Leferman was eighth in the 87-km junior men's race.

Pedaling to be the best!

Competitive fire burning inside Stehle

His name sounds like it and his conviction is made of it. Still comes from iron. It's strong and able to withstand a great deal of pressure without breaking. Ditto for Vince Stehle.

It's just that type of, well, mettle that has taken Stehle to the top of junior cycling in Canada after just two years in the sport. When this 18-year old sets his mind to something, he attacks it like a flesh-starved piranha. He once passed out on his bike during a road race in Delaware when he was straining to push his body beyond its endurable limits.

"It was a super climb up to a long hill and it was 95 degrees out. I just blacked out," Stehle recalled, while sitting in the comfort of his George Avenue home.

"He has a high threshold of pain," said his stepfather Dan Magee. "Sometimes too high."

His coach, Aldo Sfalcin of the Maple Leaf Cycling Club, was there in Delaware and couldn't what he saw.

"He just would not give up so his body shut out the lights on him," said Sfalcin. "I knew then that he had a tremendously high tolerance for pain. He can really punish himself."

Stehle's ability to drive himself to the brink – and beyond – has pushed him onto the national scene in a sport he's really still just learning.

"I won't know everything about cycling for another five years," he said. "I just feel the other riders out in a race. I watch how they're feeling pain."

At the selection races to choose the national junior road team in Quebec City last month, Stehle was up against athletes who have competed for five years or more. He beat them all.

He was the top junior rider and 10th overall out of 175 in one 80-km criterium and then finished fourth among the juniors in a 140-km stage race. Combined with a good showing in the time trial, that put him first overall among the 16 juniors vying for five national-team spots.

These races featured members of Canada's national men's team and several of the country's semi-pro teams as well as the aspiring juniors.

In the grueling 140-km stage, only 55 finished out of 175. The race followed a 10-km course which included a brutal 1.2 km climb that had to be gutted out 10 times.

"I never suffered so much," Stehle said of the climb. "People were walling up it faster than some riders were climbing it." There's nowhere to train for hills in the flatlands of Essex County. The closest he's gotten is a couple of training excursions to the rolling grounds of Kensington State Park in Michigan.

"The first four for five laps (in Quebec) were okay, but after the sixth or seventh I wanted to quit," Stehle said. "I spent the whole way around the course psyching -up for that hill."

His effort caught the attention of Wendy Mancini. Mancini was an instructor at the national junior camp, held the week prior to the selection races and she also coaches Team Mancini from Montreal.

Stehle mentioned that he wanted to find a new cycling club, perhaps up north, where the terrain and altitude are better to road training. Mancini offered him spot on her team.

"I've been working with athletes for a long time and he is one that I'm really excited about," she said. He's got tons of potential. He could be almost anything he wants to be."

Mancini was quick to challenge Stehle at the tryouts. She was among the people selecting the junior team. Of the five spots up for grabs, the top two were automatic based on the racing results and the other three were by coaches choice. "I told him he wouldn't be selected as a coaches' choice because he had no experience with mountains," Mancini said.

"I told him he was going to have to finish first or second to make the team.

“He told me racing was all in your head and you have to raise to the occasion. What he did on the mountain that was incredible. And he showed he was phenomenal sprinter too.”

Stehle got into cycling by sheer luck when one day a friend needed a bicycle part and he went along for the ride to a local shop. While there, Stehle got talking to Maple Leaf’s Paul Leferman about the sport. “I’m one for competition so after I talked to him I went to a race at the Ciociaro Club and I was hooked” Stehle said. “It was fast-paced with lots of action and it was dangerous.” If he sticks with the sport, who knows what lies ahead? There’s Olympics, in 1992, the Tour de France and Pro-European race teams. He’s got tons of potential,” said Mancini who is completing her masters’ degree at McGill University and will become a full-time exercise physiologist in the fall. “But he’s also the type of person who has to want it. If he wakes up tomorrow and decides he doesn’t want it, he won’t do it.”

That theory hold water when applied to Stehle’s schoolwork. He earned just three credits towards Grade 11 at Assumption this past year and is undecided about returning to school in the fall.

Given the intelligent way he handles himself in sport, it’s not for lack of ability but rather self-motivation. Mancini hopes to entice him with enrolment in a Quebec school that’s strictly for athletes who spend the mornins in class and the afternoons in training. Here cycling team is also education oriented.

The members include a lawyer, one student working on a PhD and another studying veterinary science. “Our members are tactically smart. They can give Vince a lot of insight into racing but he’s got incredible instincts,” said the 25-year old Mancini. “He knows how to read a race, watch a race and place himself in a good spot.” Stehle is currently in Italy for a pair of stage races with the national junior team but when he returns in mid-July he’ll move in with relatives in Montreal. If he likes it, he’ll stay on in the fall.

After the five-men team returns from Italy, the team will compete in the three-day Niagara Classic, and possibly the six-day Abitibi Tour in Quebec and later the Tour of Arizona.

National juniors are 17 and 18 years old so that means next year, Stehle will have to compete like a senior. “The transition to senior is very intricate,” Mancini said. “If it’s not done well they lose interest.” “Seniors are anyone over 18 to 35. To make a top senior athlete takes at least five years.”

“For some, if they don’t make it in the first year or two they give up. The older riders beat them on experience not talent.” “We’ve got to get Vince more experience.”

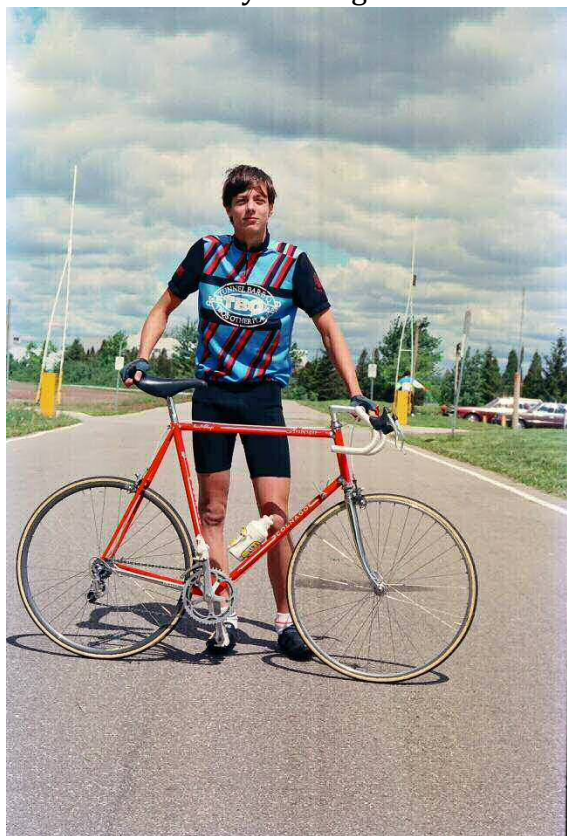

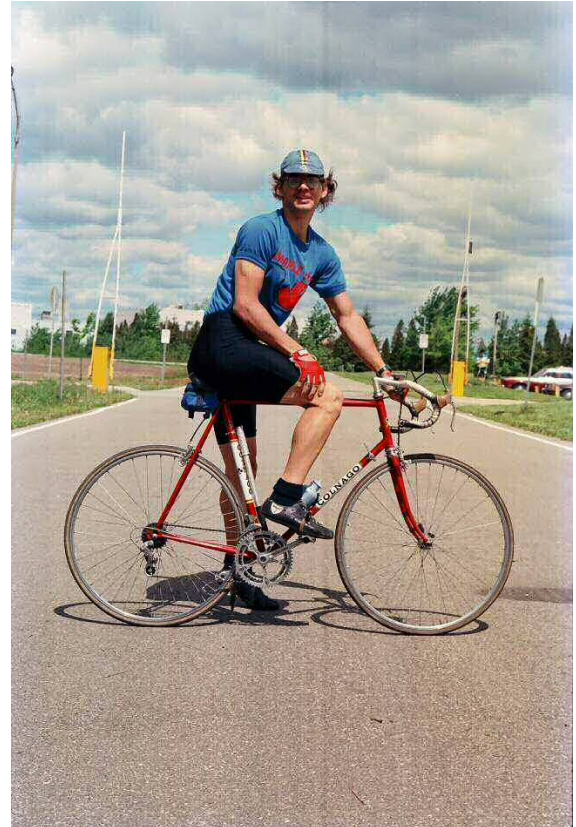

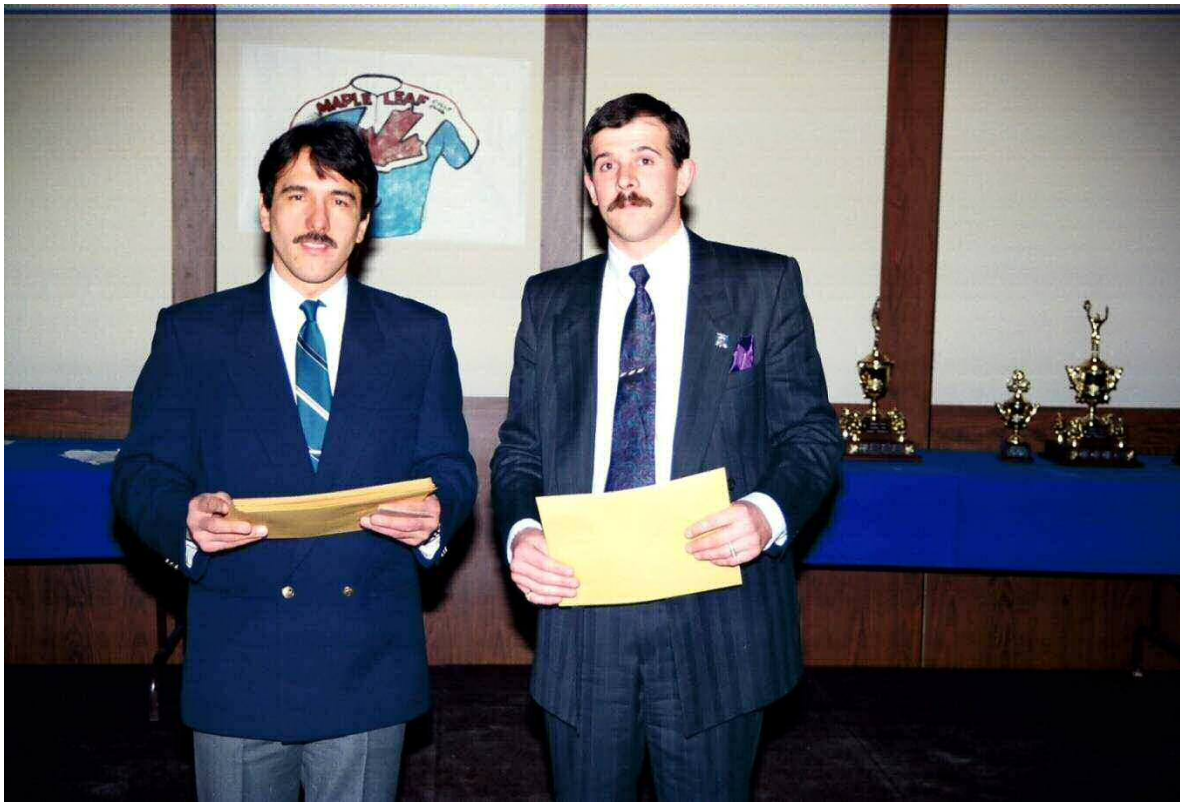

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The ride is over for the 'father' of Windsor's bike business

When John Palombo, 70, locks the doors to Courtesy Bicycles on June 30, it will be the end of an incredible 33-year ride.

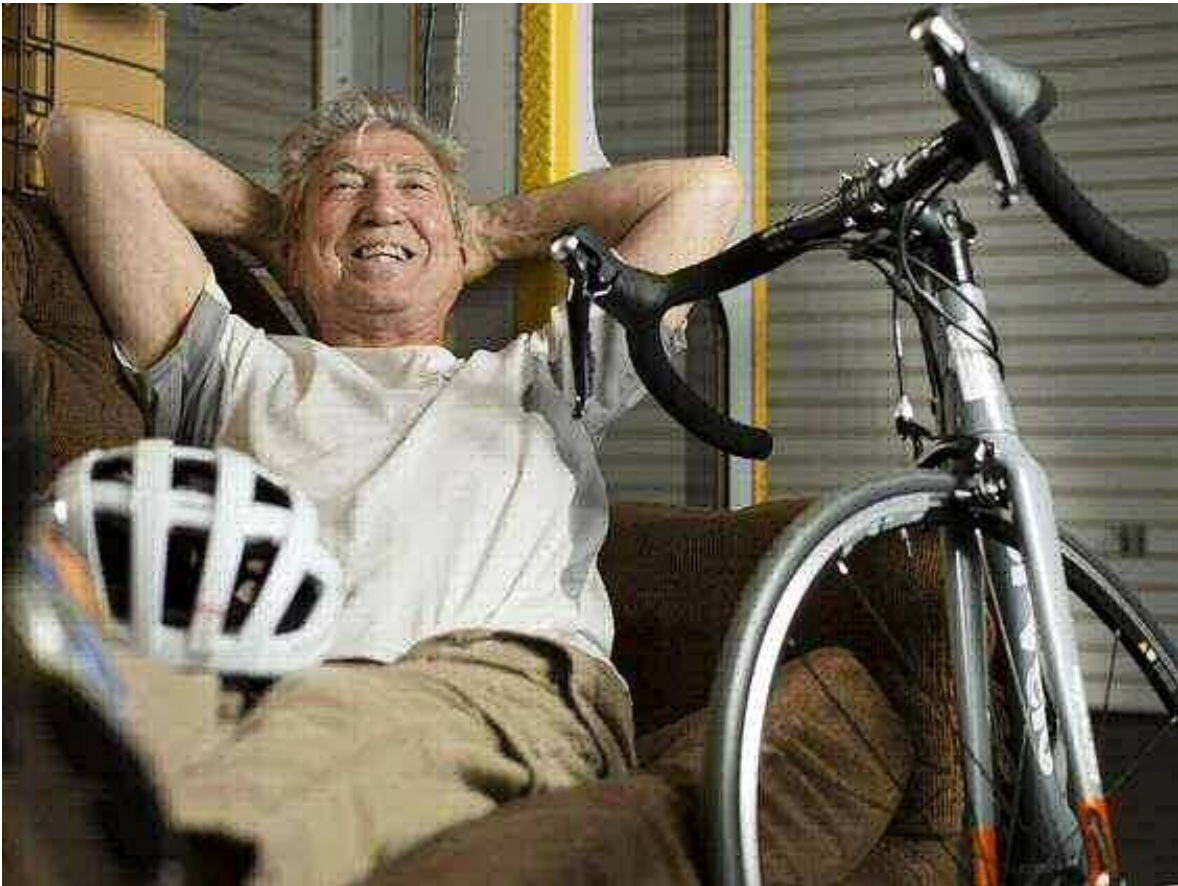

Palombo's venture into the cycling business in 1984 was somewhat of a fluke. He was in a local hardware store when the owner told him the bank was taking over the business.

"He said 'John, all the stuff in the back is bicycle-related product, you can have it all but it has to be out of here in three hours'," Palombo said. "I went outside, sat in the car for a few minutes and thought I might as well go rent a truck and go back and get it all."

He already owned a shop at 3154 Sandwich St. so he cleared it out and started remodeling it into a bicycle retail and repair shop. He knew little about the business so he hired the mechanic at the hardware store. The first couple years were slow which gave Palombo time to learn the trade. But a few years later the mountain bike craze hit and his store was packed with customers of all ages turning to cycling for the social and competitive aspects.

"The timing was just right," Palombo said. "We didn't have time to think, we had to just run, run, run. The 25 years after that are just a blur."

Over the years, Palombo has earned a reputation in the community as the father of the bike business. The shop in Olde Sandwich Towne is always busy with customers browsing the latest cycling gear or just chatting with Palombo. He prides himself on making people feel welcomed in his store, something he attributes to former Dominion House owner Sid Walman.

"He said, 'John, when a person comes to your business, you treat them like they are coming to your home,'" he said. "That's what I have always done."

Palombo is proud of the product he sells and would rather turn away a customer than sell them a bike that isn't perfect for them. Whether it's a dad wanting to buy a big bike for their child to grow into or a senior who's been told to try biking – if it's not a good fit, there's no sale.

Courtesy Bicycles has been active in the community, participating in the Lung Association rides, organizing kids' bike safety rodeos and helping Windsor and LaSalle police along with paramedics set up bike patrols.

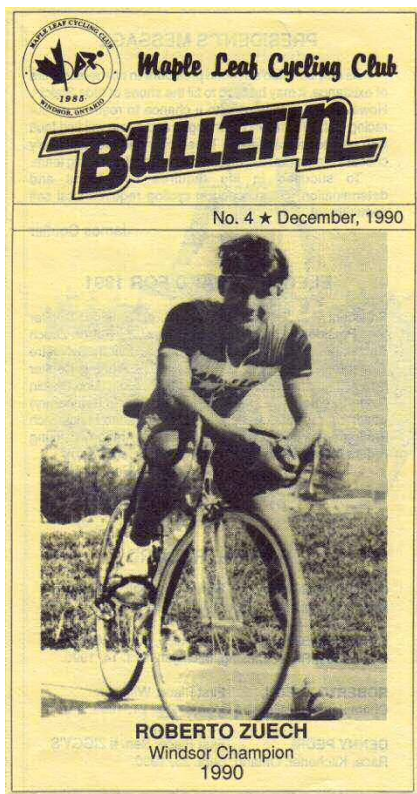
"The last 33 years have been lots of fun," he said. "I've made many friends and helped many people improve their lives while promoting a healthy lifestyle."

Retirement is bittersweet for Palombo. He'll miss the business but admits the time is right. Courtesy Bicycles ends when the owner departs, with the contents being sold.

Fittingly for Palombo, he bought himself a bike for retirement and is planning to rent "one of those homes on wheels" for a trip to Eastern Canada.

"I've reached my destination and it's time to get off," he said.
